Heart problems can't keep a good dad down

There must be some mistake, thought Johnny Gahir. After all, the robust, energetic 37-year-old father of two from Surrey exercised regularly and took good care of himself. But there was no mistaking the chest pains he was experiencing after coming home from the gym on May 3rd, 2008. A cardiology stress test at his local hospital revealed a shadow on the front of his heart and the need for a referral to RCH's cardiac team.

An angioplasty at RCH revealed that Johnny had an 80 per cent blockage to his main artery, and so a stent was inserted to restore the blood flow.

The following Valentine's Day, Johnny had an unusual feeling in his chest—and it had nothing to do

with the romantic holiday. He went to his local hospital, and was immediately referred again to RCH for another stent.

Life returned to normal for awhile until January 2012, while crossing the Canada – U.S. border, Johnny experienced an-

other heart attack. As his heart condition was proving to be resistant to treatment with stents, RCH Cardiac Surgeon Dr. Daniel Wong opted to perform open heart double bypass surgery on Johnny.

"You don't normally expect to see a patient in their 30s with an absence of risk factors like genetics, poor health, etc. suffering from heart disease, but it happens," says Dr. Wong.

Now, nothing is holding Johnny back from going about his regular routine, which includes riding on his

motorbike and running after his children.

"Half of my job is to treat the disease, and the other half is to help patients understand the disease and what they can do to help themselves. Johnny has really taken charge of his health in this respect."

Says Johnny: "From the moment you're born until you pass, at some point you're going to need the caring hands of medical professionals, and, if you're fortunate enough to be cared for by the quality staff at RCH, you're blessed."

RCH redevelopment moves forward

Our campaign for the future

On June 12, 2012, former Health Minister Michael de Jong announced the formal start of work on the redevelopment of Royal Columbian Hospital.

"Royal Columbian Hospital is at a crossroads in its history," said de Jong. "Now is the time to celebrate its past, create a vision for the future and take immediate concrete steps in the present to ensure the best care for patients both in RCH and throughout Fraser Health."

The redevelopment is anticipated to include hundreds of additional beds, a larger emergency department, a new surgical suite and consolidation of critical care beds.

The Ministry of Health and Fraser Health will be finalizing the redevelopment concept plan between now and October 2012, followed by a more detailed business plan next year, which will determine the development timeframe.



Road to London

Paralympian thanks RCH staff for help in getting to London 2012 Games

Nathan Dewitt's parents were told that their son may never be able to walk, run or ride a bike. He, and his twin brother Brenndon, were born at 27 weeks, weighing not even three pounds each.

The Dewitt twins spent almost three months in Royal Columbian Hospital (RCH)'s Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) following their birth there in 1990. Today, Nathan is relaxing at home after competing in the Men's 100- and 200-metre - T34 sprints at the 2012 Paralympic Games. Nathan placed 8th in the 100-metre with a time of 17:36 - an impressive finish for his first Paralympic Games.

Nathan and his family (mother Linda, father Shane, brothers Brenndon and Brody) chose to reunite with medical staff in RCH's NICU on Thursday, August 9 to thank them in person, after Linda sent a heartfelt letter to Fraser Health recognizing RCH staff and physicians involved in her twin boys' care.

"I wanted Royal Columbian Hospital to know what a difference they have made in my son's life," wrote Nathan's mom Linda Dewitt. "If not for all the Doctors and wonderful nurses of the Neonatal Intensive Care

Unit who looked after him (and all of his family), I can say without a doubt my son would not be who he is today!"

Babies born before 24 weeks have a survival rate of about 60 per cent, says Pediatrician Dr. David Ou Tim, who treated the Dewitt twins and still works in the NICU. "It's amazing how well some of the babies respond."

"RCH has a NICU program with one of the best

survival outcomes in Canada and a very low rate of complications for extremely premature babies," says Queenie Lai, Health Services Manager for RCH's NICU. "Teamwork involving nurses, physicians, specialists and the families themselves has been a critical part of that success since the NICU program started at RCH back in 1978."

Royal Columbian's Enduring Tradition of Training

From B.C.'s first nursing school to today's Clinical Academic Campus of UBC

Royal Columbian Hospital (RCH) will be marking two numerical milestones this year: celebrating its 150th year of operation, and welcoming its 1000th first-year medical resident.

In a province identified by its relative youth, the New Westminster hospital is an institution steeped in history, born in the days when many of the city's inhabitants still lived in tents and British Columbia was still a colony ruled from distant England.

Besides becoming a regional hub of medical care, it also became a major training centre for health professionals. It was the home of the province's first nursing school, and launched a medical residency program in 1950, the same year the Faculty of Medicine was founded (one of the residents who came through the hospital, John Noseworthy, is now the CEO of the Mayo Clinic).

The hospital formalized its educational role with UBC in 1988, leading to greater numbers of its physicians becoming clinical faculty, and aligning its curriculum with other postgraduate training programs in B.C.



That identity was reaffirmed in 2002, when Royal Columbian became a Clinical Academic Campus of UBC, reflecting its extensive educational programs and facilities. Today, those programs and facilities include a clinical teaching unit that combines training of undergraduate medical students and residents.

A first-year residency program draws 29 new physicians to the hospital each year to pursue postgraduate training, and a student-led rehabilitation clinic serves the occupational therapy and physical therapy needs of New Westminster and surrounding communities.

"Royal Columbian has a huge capacity in clinical care," says Dr. Dale Stogryn, UBC's Site Director for medical education. "For example, it has the highest interventional cardiology volume in Canada outside Toronto, and very high neurosurgery volumes. At the same time, we've maintained a family atmosphere. Students like to come here because they're welcomed as part of the team."

Medical miracle for mom

Maternity and cardiac teams save young mother

In Dec. 2009, Amie MacNeil was induced into labour at RCH, as she had developed mild hypertension. Little did she know at the time she would undergo a medical crisis, and if it wasn't for the staff and services at RCH, may not have survived the birth of her son, Jacob.

"After a lengthy labour and a C-section, I was still able to hold my son and feed him for the first time."

That is all she can remember before the post-natal ordeal that followed. Amie started to hemorrhage, and doctors had to remove her uterus. Then, during surgery, Amie went into cardiac arrest.

When the doctor came back, he told Amie's husband Todd that she was stabilized, but still in rough shape.

"I asked the nurses to bring Jacob down because nobody knew if Amy would make it through the night," he says.

Over the next several days, doctors fought to take Amie off a respirator. After performing a tracheotomy to help her breathe without a respirator, Amie was on her way to recovery.

Amie was finally discharged on Dec. 30. "We were lucky to have been at Royal Columbian...they went above and beyond." Read the full story on rchcares.com
